Ditch Cleanout/Yard Waste in Nunnlea Dumpster

In response to an e-mail received on behalf of a resident, Mayor Fore explained the comments in the last newsletter about the ditch cleanout and the city's future plans for keeping it clear.

There was also a complaint about an individual filling the dumpster at Nunnlea with yard waste. Commissioner Hardin explained it was from debris behind the homes on Hurstbourne Circle.

Minutes for Meeting on July 22, 2010

Commissioner Dunn made a motion to accept the minutes as published. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Lynch and passed unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

John Price read the treasurer's report for July, 2010 and copies were made available for all people in attendance. Commissioner Dunn then made a motion to approve as read, which was seconded by Commissioner Lynch. The motion passed without opposition.

Warrants

The warrants for July, 2010 were then read by John Price, and copies were made available for all people in attendance. Commissioner Dunn made a motion to approve payment of the warrants, which was seconded by Commissioner Lynch. After discussion, the warrants were approved, with Commissioner Hardin voting in opposition to warrant #11-54.

Letter from KLC

The city received a letter of congratulations from the Kentucky League of Cities addressed to Police Chief Redman for our Police Department's achievement of a 100% score on the recent Law Enforcement Scorecard.

Trover Solutions

Gwendolyn Coleman, Director – Human Resources with Trover Solutions, provider of healthcare recoveries and insurance subrogation located on Bunsen Way, sent a letter of appreciation to Mayor Fore. Chief Chris Redman and Officer Rusty Bittle responded to a potential security incident on 8/17/10. She said that, "He and Officer Bittle displayed a high level of professionalism, and as always, treated our associates with respect and dignity."

Police Report

Police Chief Chris Redman reported as follows:
-237 police hours from 7/10/10 to 8/10/10,
-3 citations, 2 arrests,
-3 reports,
-2 accidents,
-7 traffic stops,
-3 ongoing investigations,

In other news, Police Chief Redman advised that well fair checks are being performed, i.e. checking on elderly residents in the city; there are increased park patrols, and the number of homeless persons found in our city has increased, primarily at businesses. Finally, it was noted that two of the stolen Blowing Tree signs have been recovered from suspects as a result of the investigation.

Attorney's Report

Attorney Steve Emery had nothing new about which to report.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Police

Commissioner Dunn had nothing new beyond the Police Chief report.

Roads and Lighting

Commissioner Lynch reported on the following:
-Blowing Tree speed hump sign missing,
-Street sign for Blowing Tree reinstalled,
-Geese have returned,
-Resident on Bristol called about someone in his yard around the light pole, the same light pole that was not functioning. He was directed to contact LG&E,

-Commissioner Lynch has joined the Kentucky League of Cities Task Force.

Parks Commissioner

Commissioner Hardin's report included the following:

-Individuals were found in the park late at night, and given a warning by Police Chief Redman,

-Police Chief Redman assisted a 91-year-old handicapped resident who had fallen out of his bed/chair,

-Bee Keeper was contacted about the bees in the sand, who advised that this type of bee is generally harmless and should be gone in about one month,

-Lights in the park are now installed, and a transformer was replaced,

-City Picnic plans are wrapping up; the sand has been cleaned, turned up and rotated, and the tables repaired.

Sanitation

Commissioner Renninger advised that the recycling is going very well, about 55% of residents are participating. Back-door service continues to be a problem. In other news, it was mentioned that in purchasing a new computer for the city, Commissioner Renninger was able to save the city about \$600.

OLD BUSINESS

City Hall

Although the intention was to have the Mayor and Commissioners go door to door to personally talk with residents and determine their position on the proposed purchase of land and the building of a new City Hall, Mayor Fore decided to cancel those plans. He gave several reasons: 1) he was unable to adequately develop a script that would easily and efficiently explain the plans for City Hall that would allow residents to make an informed decision, 2) it was extremely difficult to be completely objective in the presentation (the Mayor and each Commissioner have their own strong opinions about the project), 3) with 11 people running for the five positions in the upcoming election (Mayor and four Commissioners), he felt that it was more reasonable and fair for these candidates to do the canvassing. They could explain their position and let the residents decide who best to represent them on the council beginning in 2011. A concern was raised that the information provided to the residents may not be consistent and accurate.

There being no further business or discussion, the meeting was adjourned.
