That bar should be parallel with the roadway, so the driver can use his truck's extending arm to lift and empty the bin. (The brown garbage cans are still lifted and dumped by hand.)

## Golden Watch Program

In order to fulfill a campaign promise, I have spearheaded an initiative to help our aging population in the City of Hurstbourne Acres. It is the goal of the Hurstbourne Acres Police Department to assist families who are caring for a loved one with dementia. We are aware that they face many challenges. Dementia is both a physically and emotionally crippling disease, and our officers have seen first hand what this devastating disease can do to families.

The program has three phases:

### Phase 1

Identify and address families in need of assistance. Our officers will make on-site contacts to assess willing families and introduce them to the program. One example might be a home inspection to advise the family how to better prepare their home for caring for their loved one. In addition, officers could take pictures of the family member to be placed on file in the HAPD office in case of emergency and/or work with the family to establish an emergency protocol.

### Phase 2

Establish a support system using state and local agencies to provide families with resources for both physical and emotional needs.

### Phase 3

Follow up with the families and educate the community about the program.

## Meet Your Mailman

Mike Thompson has been delivering our mail here in Hurstbourne Acres since 1992. It takes him about 2-1/2 hours to sort the mail at the post office, then another 2-1/2 hours to make deliveries to our homes, which include all the residential streets from the

berm over to Taylorsville Road. Another 1 hour in the Taylorhurst commercial area, then 1-1/2 to 2 hours at the Cherry Springs and Camden apartment complexes completes a typical day. Beginning August 13, Mike's area will include Cardwell Way as well. From another perspective: 185 houses x 6 days x 52 weeks x 19 years = 1,096,680 deliveries. That's a lot of mailboxes opened and closed!

Other than wishing for a few more shady areas to park his truck, Mike says this is a pleasant area to deliver—nice people and nice dogs. Of course, those sneaky low spots in your yard, the ones that he can't see under a lush lawn, have tripped him up a few times.

Louisville is Mike's hometown, and he has worked for the U.S. Postal Service for 33 years. You might also run into him in Hart County or his garden, or at St. Matthews Methodist where he conducts a weekly children's Bible-study fellowship.

In the recent past Ira Pinnix has delivered on Cardwell. Nick George is the go-to guy for Hurstbourne Circle, East Chase Apartments and the businesses on both sides of Bunsen Way.

### **Minutes for Meeting on June 9, 2011**

After discussion, and correction to the minutes removing Commissioner Kuster as an attendee at the June meeting, Commissioner Kuster made a motion to accept the minutes as published. The motion was then seconded by Commissioner Price and passed without opposition. As a point of clarification, Attorney Stewart confirmed that "minutes" are not intended to be a transcript of the meeting, but just a compilation of the points discussed and actions taken or to be taken.

### **Treasurer's Report**

Sharon Hollkamp read the treasurer's report for June 2011 and copies were made available for all people in attendance. Commissioner Price made a motion

to approve as read, which was seconded by Commissioner Kuster. The motion passed without opposition.

### **Warrants**

The warrants for June 2011 were then presented by Sharon Hollkamp, and copies were made available for all people in attendance. After discussion, Commissioner Price made a motion to approve the warrants as presented. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Kuster which passed unopposed.

### **Police Report**

Police Chief Redman reported on the following:

- 494 coverage hours from 6/9/11 to 7/14/11 (which included 24 training hours)
- 378 police/public interactions
- 0 arrests
- 1 traffic citation
- 5 reports
- burglary at Camden Meadows
- attempted burglary at Cardwell Way
- hit & run at Camden Meadows
- graffiti at Blowing Tree
- domestic violence at East Chase
- 6 traffic stops
- 7 dispatched runs
- all businesses checked
- 5 house watches completed
- 13 suspicious circumstances
- 4 motorist assists
- 3 families enrolled in the Golden Watch Program

In other news, all outstanding grant monies have been received by the City. Police Chief Redman will be attending the upcoming Police Chief's Conference in Lexington.

### **Attorney's Report**

City Attorney John Frith Stewart had nothing new about which to report.

## **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

### **Parks**

Commissioner Kuster received words of appreciation for the landscaping being completed around the city entrance sign at Cardwell Way. In other news, he contacted another company, Steve's Lawn & Tree Service, to do cleanup in the berm

area on Bunsen Way. The quoted cost was \$800/day, not to exceed \$4000. Attorney Stewart requested that a copy of the Certificate of Insurance be faxed to his office for review. Commissioner Hardin mentioned a problem on Cardwell Way where there are tree limbs overhanging the street. Commissioner Hardin contacted another company called Steve's Trees Unlimited for this cleanup. After further discussion, Commissioner Price made a motion to approve the bid of \$800/day, not to exceed \$4000, for the work quoted. Commissioner Kuster seconded the motion. A roll call vote was requested. Commissioners Price, Kuster & Renninger voted "yes" with Commissioner Hardin abstaining. The motion passed.

The date set for the city picnic is 9/25/11. Commissioner Renninger made a suggestion about utilizing Rumpke's cardboard recycle bins that can be used for special events. Graffiti in the park has been removed. During the recent storm, several tree branches came down in the park, which will be cleared.

#### **Sanitation**

Commissioner Price reported that the orange trashcan at the old bus stop on Taylorsville Rd would be moved to the Park. Concerning the possibility of having a joint sanitation contract with some of our city's surrounding municipalities, after a general discussion the issue was tabled until Mayor Fore returns next month.

#### **Streets & Lights**

Commissioner Hardin advised that two persons were contacted about providing service to clean out the ditch in front of Nunnlea. There were complaints about high grass in the ditch preventing an adequate view of Hurstbourne Parkway, high water spilling over onto the road, and potential health risks. A bid of \$300 was furnished. It was confirmed that the ditch actually belongs to the state and the State Highway Department is technically responsible for its maintenance, including mowing three times per year. However, Commissioner Hardin decided that action should be taken now to protect the residents living on Hurstbourne Circle

and anyone entering or leaving Hurstbourne Circle. After discussion, Commissioner Price made a motion to approve the cleanout of the ditch for \$300. Commissioner Hardin seconded the motion, and it passed without opposition.

As mentioned earlier, Commissioner Hardin was made aware of problems caused by tree branches overhanging Cardwell Way. He was quoted \$1950/day to not only cut the trees back on Cardwell but also clean up the berm on Bunsen Way. In lieu of the approval by the Commission to have another vendor do the work on Bunsen, he will research this further before proceeding.

#### **Police**

Commissioner Renninger reported that the Police Department has completed its annual employee review. It was also mentioned that there are currently three families enrolled in the Golden Watch Program. Commissioner Renninger outlined the total monies received back from grants and confirmed that all outstanding grant money has now been received. Finally, she advised that the Police Department ended the prior fiscal year under budget. Commissioner Price offered to resurrect the Block Watch program by recruiting additional captains.

#### **OLD BUSINESS**

##### **Miscellaneous**

A deficit budget ordinance was again mentioned. As indicated at last month's meeting, it would include another line in the budget ordinance that would balance the budget. The line would reflect a "carry-forward transfer" which would equal the difference between budgeted revenue and budgeted expenses. There was no movement on this issue. The recent energy audit by LG&E revealed that the city has 81 streetlights. There was no answer as to whether the City of Hurstbourne Acres will need to reimburse LG&E or the City of Hurstbourne for incorrect billing. Finally, a review of the City's legal bills was tabled until next month's meeting.

There being no further business or discussion, the meeting was adjourned.
