Golden Watch

With the temperature on the rise it is time that we begin to take measures to prevent heat-related illness. Remember to keep cool and use common sense. The following tips are also important:

1. Drink plenty of fluids.

- Caution:** If your doctor has prescribed a fluid-restricted diet or diuretics, ask your doctor how much you should drink.
- Avoid drinks containing alcohol or caffeine because they will actually cause you to lose more fluid.
- Drinking plenty of liquids during exercise is especially important. Avoid very cold beverages because they can cause stomach cramps.

2. Wear appropriate clothing and sunscreen.

- Choose lightweight, light colored, loose fitting clothing. A wide-brimmed hat will provide shade and keep the head cool.

3. Schedule outdoor activities carefully.

- If you take a daily walk, do so in the early morning.

- When working in your yard do so before noon and not in the heat of the day. Pay attention to the weather authority of your choice, and stay indoors during the hottest part of the day.
- Pace yourself while outdoors, and rest in a shady area frequently.

4. Stay cool indoors.

- The best way to beat the heat is to stay indoors in a cool air-conditioned area.
- If you do not have air conditioning, use a fan.
- A cool shower or bath is an effective way to cool off. Also, use your stove and oven less to maintain a cooler temperature in your home.

5. Use common sense.

- Do not leave small children, the elderly, or pets in a parked car.
- Avoid hot foods and heavy meals as they may add heat to your body.
- Make sure to keep your pet cool by giving them plenty of fresh water and leave the water in a shady area.

Your best defense against heat-related illness is prevention. Never put off calling for medical attention if you think you are having a heat-related illness. Staying cool and making simple changes in your fluid intake, activities, and clothing during hot weather can help you remain safe and healthy.

Introduction of New Police Officer

Police Chief Redman introduced the newly hired Police Officer, Mike Moore. His qualifications and experience were outlined. Officer Moore's primary duties will include patrolling on weekends and evenings.

Minutes for Meeting on June 14, 2012

After review of the draft copy of the minutes, Commissioner Price proposed changes. Commissioner Renninger made a motion to approve

the minutes with those changes. Commissioner Price seconded the motion, which passed without opposition.

Treasurer's Report

In Sharon Hollkamp's absence, Mayor Fore read the treasurer's report for June 2012 and copies were made available for all people in attendance. After some questions, Commissioner Renninger made a motion to accept the report as presented. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Kuster and passed unopposed.

Warrants

In Sharon Hollkamp's absence, Mayor Fore read the warrants for June 2012 and copies were made available for all people in attendance. During a discussion, Commissioner Renninger mentioned that the Police Chief/Officers would like a monthly wage & earning statement with each pay period. After the discussion was complete, Mayor Fore asked for an approval of the warrants with all Commissioners voting in favor.

Introduction of Marilyn Parker

District 18 Metro Council Member Candidate, Marilyn Parker, was introduced by Mayor Fore. In answering a question about discretionary funds, she outlined her position. More information about that issue and the candidate can be found at marilyn4metro.com. The winner of the election in November will replace the current council member, Jon Ackerson.

BD's Mongolian Grill Presentation

David Ackman, owner of BD's Mongolian Grill, presented to the Commission the proposed changes/additions to the restaurant. Generally, it will be an increase in the size of the patio area by 2000 sq ft with the location being on the Liquor Outlet side of the restaurant. After questions from the Commission and residents, Commissioner Kuster made a motion to approve the changes and issue a Certificate of Compliance. Commissioner Renninger seconded the motion, and it passed without opposition.

Police Report

Police Chief Redman reported on the following:
345 coverage hours from 6/14/12 to 7/12/12

- 0 arrests or citations
- 0 reports
- 1 investigation
- 6 traffic stops
- 6 motorist assists
- 7 suspicious circumstances

In other news, as mentioned earlier in the meeting, Mike Moore has been hired as the new police officer. He will begin his duties next week.

Attorney's Report

Attorney Stewart prepared an ordinance regarding the change in the location of the city meetings. In a question about the status of the Open Records appeal, he advised that he has provided his input and it is now in the hands of the Attorney General.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Parks

Commissioner Kuster began by mentioning that the bees are back in the park, and the sand has been treated. Regarding the picnic and the honor guard used in the past, Commissioner Hardin provided information.

Sanitation

Commissioner Price was asked what to do with the remaining Rumpke cans. Not all of the cans from the residents have been picked up. It was suggested that those cans which are left may be used by the residents. However, in order to prevent any future problems or misunderstandings, Attorney Stewart or Commissioner Price will send a letter to Rumpke. A few residents said that they observed Eco-Tech employees putting yard waste in the same truck with household waste. Commissioner Price will check into that. Concerning how Eco-Tech's services compare to Rumpke's, Commissioner Price said she would be walking around a new flyer this weekend to clarify the services provided, including the pickup of large items. She also mentioned that either Eco-Tech or she will be taking magnets with the pickup schedule to each residence. In a side note, it was reported that Eco-Tech has free trees available which they will bring and plant themselves.

Commissioner Price will check and see if these are also available for private residents. Finally, for those interested, the current book being read in the Book Club, which meets monthly on a Monday afternoon, is *In the Woods* by Tana French.

Streets & Lights

Commissioner Hardin reported that the "No Turn on Red" sign for the corner of Bunsen and Hurstbourne Parkway is being made. It is designed to help those residents on Hurstbourne Circle in exiting and entering. Also, one of the 19 stop signs in the city will be replaced due to its condition. The other stop signs are not consistent in their appearance, with some of the poles larger, taller, or shorter than others. This will be corrected. In answer to a question from Commissioner Price, Commissioner Hardin said he would handle the removal of the old bus stop pole at the corner of Taylorsville Rd & Hurstbourne Lane. Finally, Commissioner Hardin mentioned that as of today, 7/12/12, Hurstbourne Acres is now officially a 4th Class City. In recognition of the work by State Representative Julie Raque Adams in getting that legislation passed, Commissioner Hardin said he would send a letter of appreciation.

Police

After a question from Commissioner Price, Commissioner Renninger reported further on the process of hiring Mike Moore as the new city police officer. Regarding the new design for the city website, hurstbourneacres.org, she encouraged everyone to check it out. It will continue to be updated & improved.

NEW/OLD BUSINESS

1st Reading of Ordinance #4, Series 2012

Mayor Fore completed the first reading of Ordinance #4, Series 2012, establishing the change in the location of the regular meetings of the City Commission.

Miscellaneous

Mayor Fore said that he has not heard back from Kathleen Owen from the Nunnlea Beautification League concerning the cost of the ditch cleanout in front. Regarding the proposed sidewalk along side the Meadows Apartments on Blowing Tree, Mayor

Fore said that he was advised to petition the owner of the land so that construction of the sidewalk could be considered and completed. MSD has not been contacted about the drainage problem for the resident on Blowing Tree. The idea of an “e-blast” was presented, which is a mass e-mail to residents of the city regarding local issues important to all residents. Finally, in a question from Commissioner Kuster concerning zoning issues, Attorney Stewart advised that an ordinance would first need to be

passed to establish a Zoning Board to make zoning decisions. Mayor Fore asked the attorney to prepare an ordinance for next month’s meeting.

There being no further business or discussion, the meeting was adjourned.

12. Comm. Kuster's agreement with Lam-Trackers stipulates that his involvement in the plot is not to be mentioned.

Discussion followed and the Mayor made a motion to remove Comm. Kuster from his office. Comm. Renninger seconded the motion, and a roll call vote was held. Comm. Renninger, Comm. Hardin, and Mayor Fore voted to remove; and Comm. Price voted against removal. Since the vote was not unanimous, as required, he will not be removed.

Mayor Fore then made a motion to censure Comm. Kuster. The commission voted on the following resolution: Comm Kuster should be censured for his actions as it relates to the investigation conducted by Lam-Trackers and for signing the contract. Further, Comm. Kuster's actions were unbecoming an elected official. A vote was held on the resolution. Comm. Renninger, Comm. Hardin, and Mayor Fore voted for the resolution; and Comm. Price opposed the resolution. The resolution was passed.

There being no further discussion, the meeting was adjourned.
