Things to be aware of:

- Telemarketing Fraud
- Fraudulent Charities
- Home Improvement Scams
- Identity Theft
- Sweepstakes Scams

The following steps may prevent you from being scammed:

- Request any solicitations in writing.
- Never give personal information to someone you don't know.
- Don't be pressured into contributing or making decisions about a major purchase.
- NEVER pay in full before services are rendered.
- Never send money for free gifts.
- Check with the Better Business Bureau before hiring someone to do work for you.
- Shred any personal information before discarding.
- Never carry large sums of money on you, as well as, valuable jewelry or all your credit cards.

1. Unused or expired prescription medications are a public safety issue, which lead to accidental poisoning, overdose, and abuse.
2. Pharmaceutical drugs can be just as dangerous as street drugs when taken without a prescription or a doctor's supervision.
3. The non-medical use of prescription drugs ranks second only to marijuana as the most common form of drug abuse in America.
4. The majority of teenagers abusing prescription drugs get them from family and friends, and the home medicine cabinet.
5. Unused prescription drugs thrown in the trash can be retrieved and abused or illegally sold. Unused drugs that are flushed contaminate the water supply. Proper disposal of unused drugs saves lives and protects the environment.

You may have noticed that there is a new face keeping a watchful eye over the City of Hurstbourne Acres. In August, HAPD hired Officer Michael Moore as part-time patrolmen. Shortly after assuming his new position Moore sat down with me to tell us a bit about himself.

Moore first became a police officer in 1985, serving 20 years on the Jeffersontown Police Department, five of those years as a detective, and retiring in 2005. Between then and now, Moore has worked security at Southeast Christian Church, where he is also a member. He continues to provide security at Southeast when he is not working for Hurstbourne Acres.

Moore grew up in Pleasure Ridge Park and graduated from Desales High School. He went on to play football for the University of Kentucky from 1981 to 1982, as offensive guard. His wife is a college professor and author of children's books. His father is a veteran of the Jefferson County Police Department, retiring in 1981.

Moore is excited to be serving a small, intimate community like Hurstbourne Acres where he can get to know the residents personally. If you see him out on patrol, take the time to introduce yourself and welcome him to the neighborhood.

Minutes for Meeting on July 12, 2012

After review of the draft copy of the minutes, Commissioner Renninger made a motion to approve the minutes as published. Commissioner Kuster seconded the motion, which passed without opposition. As a result of a suggestion from Commissioner Price, Mayor Fore instructed the Clerk to include specific changes to the DRAFT copy of minutes in all future minutes.

Treasurer's Report

Sharon Hollkamp read the treasurer's report for July 2012 and copies were made available for all people in attendance. After some questions, Commissioner Price made a motion to accept the report as presented. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Kuster and passed unopposed.

Warrants

Sharon Hollkamp read the warrants for July 2012 and copies were made available for all people in attendance. After a discussion, Commissioner Renninger asked where \$4000 from the Police Fund had gone. Treasurer Hollkamp said that she would check her records and provide specifics to Commissioner Renninger after the meeting. Mayor Fore requested approval of the warrants as read, with all commissioners voting in favor.

Attorney's Report

Attorney Stewart had nothing specific to report. Mayor Fore asked the attorney to have ready for next month's meeting an ordinance to establish the city Zoning Board. The Mayor also requested that an update be provided next month regarding the unpaid property taxes from last fiscal year.

Police Report

Police Chief Redman reported on the following:

- 418 coverage hours from 7/12/12 to 8/9/12
- 0 arrests or citations
- 0 reports
- 7 traffic stops
- 15 suspicious circumstances
- 2 911 calls
- 146 checks on houses or elderly residents

In other news, Police Chief Redman spoke with IPL (Inspections, Permits & Licenses) personnel concerning a residence on Addington. The house was inspected in June, and a citation issued to the owner for violation of zoning. An IPL inspector followed up on 8/7. The outside of the residence is still not in compliance. A summons is being issued to the owner, which the HAPD will deliver. The HAPD has tried to make contact with the owner several times, but without success. It will continue to do so until contact is made. Office Moore is now on duty doing solo patrol. Summer Firearms training was completed. Regarding the upcoming City Picnic, the HAPD is developing a list of residents who will need a food plate delivered to them. Anyone who knows of a resident who needs this service is encouraged to contact Police Chief Redman by email.

Matt Anderson Introduced

Matt Anderson from Edward Jones Investments was introduced. He works with Treasurer HollKamp in creating an investment strategy for the City.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Parks

Commissioner Kuster provided information on the upcoming picnic 9/9/12 including the color guard, the caterer, games, a magician, face drawing, the band, & the projected cost. The cost of the picnic last year was \$4810, and the cost for this year's picnic should be about \$4970. As in years past, there will be door prizes.

Sanitation

Commissioner Price began by mentioning she has magnets and yard-waste stickers available, which were provided by EcoTech. A list has been created of those residents who want to retain their large recycle bins in lieu of the expected 65-gallon recycle bins. The process should be completed around the middle of August. The Book Club will be reading Gore Vidal's *Lincoln* for those interested. It was also mentioned that this Tuesday, August 14, is the deadline for those who wish to register to run for City Commission. In a question from a resident, Commissioner Price confirmed that backyard pickup service is being provided as part of the contract.

Streets & Lights

Commissioner Hardin reported that the "No Turn on Red" sign for the corner of Bunsen and Hurstbourne Parkway has been installed. It is designed to help those residents on Hurstbourne Circle in exiting and entering. The pole on Taylorsville Rd has been removed. Residents have asked Commissioner Hardin about the possibility of a walking path between Cardwell Way and the main subdivision. He is checking further and will provide more information as it becomes available. Pricing for restriping the streets should be obtained within the next 30 days. Finally, the water drainage problem for a resident on Blowing Tree remains unresolved. Mayor Fore believes that MSD has a responsibility, at least to come out and make recommendations. He asked Commissioner Hardin to contact them. A ditch has been suggested as a possible solution.

Police

Commissioner Renninger reported that everyone in the HAPD, including herself, has qualified on the firing range. All police officers have passed their physicals. There has been a problem with solicitation in the City. Sixteen "No Solicitation" signs, which are larger than the current signs, will be installed around the City. The ban on solicitation does not apply to religious or political groups. The problem of the cut-through between the apartments and Hoke Road was again mentioned.

NEW/OLD BUSINESS

Sidewalk along Blowing Tree

Mayor Fore read the letter he sent to the Management at the Meadows Apartments, with a copy to their corporate office. It outlined the need for the sidewalk and the use of the land on the apartment side for that purpose. As of today, he has not received a reply.

Hoke Road Problem

Mayor Fore read another letter sent to the manager of the Meadows Apartments about the illegal access from the Apartments to Hoke Road through a property owner's residence. That resident has been asked to put up "No Trespassing" signs that will be enforced by HAPD. In addition, the letter mentioned the need to remove 2 dead trees on the Apartment's property which represent a safety issue for Hurstbourne Acres residents. We have requested that the trees be removed and new trees planted as required by ordinance within the next 30 days. If there is no reply, Mayor Fore will have the attorney send a follow up letter.

2nd Reading of Ordinance #4, Series 2012

Mayor Fore completed the second reading of Ordinance #4, Series 2012, establishing the change in the location of the regular meetings of the City Commission. Commissioner Renninger then made a motion to enact and ordain, which was seconded by Commissioner Kuster. The motion passed without opposition.

Blast Email

Regarding the use of Blast Email to inform residents of issues important to everyone in the city, it was recommended that it be mentioned in the newsletter to get feedback.

Nunnlea Ditch

In order to keep the ditch in front of Nunnlea cleaned out, and to remove the City from liability, Commissioner Hardin suggested that Hurstbourne Acres contribute \$600 each year. That money would be given to Nunnlea who would share the expense and be responsible for getting the cleanout completed. After a discussion, Mayor Fore advised he would provide contacts and a phone number for the DOT, etc., to Nunnlea. Commissioner Hardin made a motion to pay Nunnlea as suggested. Although Mayor Fore seconded the motion, there was no follow through in passing the motion.

There being no further business or discussion, the meeting was adjourned.
