**Golden Watch Program  
Commissioner Teresa Renninger**

Swimming gets results for seniors. There have been many studies recently looking into the benefits of swimming and it's effects on our Senior community. Simple water activities such as walking, stretching and dancing can lead to greater **flexibility**. Activities that are difficulty out of the water you can do with ease in the water.

On average, water exercise participants increased their **strength** by 27% in the quadriceps, 40% in the hamstrings, and about 10% in the upper body region.

Water provides 12 times the resistance of air, so as you walk, you're really strengthening and building muscle. This increase in strength is attributed to the resistance that can be more easily experienced in water than on land.

Water courses enhance flexibility, and cardiovascular and muscular **endurance**. Participants have a choice of a group "aqua-aerobics" activity in the pool or individual lap swimming. There is less strain on joints and ligaments so less chance for injury with this type of activity. In aqua-aerobics an instructor demonstrates the various exercises of arms, legs and core body, which are often done to music. These courses usually meet several times per week.

For those with bone, muscle, or joint troubles, the warmth, buoyancy, and resistance of the water challenges the body while easing strain on problematic area. The benefits can include a decrease in pain, improved daily function, and improved perceived quality of life.

To find a water class near you check with the local swim clubs, YMCA's and many hotel pools offer water classes for a fee. **Before you start a new form of exercise always check with your doctor.**

The regular meeting of the City Commission was called to order at 7:30 PM on May 16, 2013 at the meeting room of the Hurstbourne Acres City Hall/Police Department, 1916 Hurstbourne Circle, Louisville, Kentucky, with the following persons present;

**April 11, 2013 Minutes**

After review of the draft copy of the minutes, Commissioner Lynch made a motion to accept as published. The motion, which was seconded by Commissioner Miles, passed unopposed.

**Treasurer's Report**

In Sharon Hollkamp's absence, Mayor Fore read the treasurer's report for April, 2013 and copies were made available for all people in attendance. Commissioner Lynch made a motion to accept as read. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Price and passed without opposition.

**Police Report**

Police Chief Redman reported that between 4/11/13 & 5/16/13, there were 210 coverage hours. There were approximately 700 police/public contacts. No arrests or citations were issued. One theft report was made at (address withheld). One accident was reported on Bunsen Way. House watches were completed as requested. All police officers completed their Spring weapon range qualifications. There is one ongoing investigation with the FBI. Commissioner Lynch asked about the traffic pattern problem for the residents on Hurstbourne Circle. The problem is caused by the backup that develops on both sides of Bunsen Way along with the timing of the lights at the intersection. Police Chief Redman said that he will contact the J-Town Police Chief to discuss a solution. Concerning the parking problem on Blowing Tree, Police Chief Redman recommended installing poles approximately every 40 feet on the top of which will be 'No Parking' signs and through which a cable can be run. Commissioner Lynch mentioned the cost of striping, and particularly a better way to define the raised median on Bunsen to help prevent collisions. In a question from Commissioner Lynch, Police Chief Redman confirmed that the lights on the City's police vehicles match those found on Louisville Metro police vehicles. Finally, Commissioner Lynch provided an initial report concerning the former path between 2 houses on (address withheld). It was determined that there is no easement there, but there is a ditch that might be converted to a walking or bike path. More information will be provided at next month's meeting.

**Attorney's Report**

Steve Emery reported that he is still waiting for the 'Proof of Claim' back regarding the Conley matter which needs to be executed by the City treasurer. Mayor Fore requested that the additional paper copy be given to him. The attorney also indicated that he still needs more information regarding the outstanding or delinquent property tax bills.

## **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

### **Sanitation**

Commissioner Price reported on the success of the A+ Shredding Company service provided to the City last month. A service to pick up and dispose of any unwanted electronics will be provided in July.

### **Parks**

Commissioner Miles advised that the signs for the City Yard Sale this Saturday, 5/18, are up and the 'no parking' signs will be in place shortly. The new playground equipment has been installed. A complaint from Stump Busters was received about the difficulty in mowing in areas with low hanging branches. After receiving additional information from resident, Terry McAllister, a fence permit has been authorized. The park flag is back, and the City picnic has been scheduled for 9/21/13.

### **Streets & Lights**

Commissioner Lynch had nothing further to report.

### **Police**

Commissioner Renninger reported that an application for our ordinance dealing with door to door salesman and peddlers (Ordinance #7, Series 2012) has been developed and sent to the City clerk. She also proposed applying for a grant concerning the 'Golden Watch Program'. The money would be used to purchase an ID maker for our older residents who don't drive, and for children. Finally, Commissioner Renninger noted that she is working with the City attorney regarding new contracts for our City police officers.

## **NEW/OLD BUSINESS**

### **Second Reading of Ad Valorem Tax Ordinance**

The second reading of Ordinance #1, Series 2013, establishing the Ad Valorem Tax for the upcoming fiscal year was completed by Mayor Fore. Commissioner Lynch made a motion to enact and ordain. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Miles, and passed without opposition.

### **Second Reading of Budget Ordinance**

After discussion and an explanation of changes by the Mayor, the second reading of Ordinance #2, Series 2013, establishing the budget for the upcoming fiscal year was completed by Mayor Fore. Commissioner Renninger made a motion to enact and ordain. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Miles and passed unanimously.

### **Miscellaneous**

Commissioner Miles suggested that the City continue to pursue with management of the Apartment Complex the installation of a sidewalk on Blowing Tree. He plans on setting up a meeting with them to discuss. In a question by Commissioner Miles regarding the supply of gift cards the City uses for transients, Commissioner Renninger advised that the current supply is adequate. Mayor Fore confirmed for Attorney Emery that the City is still interested in developing an ordinance for taxing the sale of alcoholic beverages in our city. However, he still needs to confirm that the taxes collected will justify the efforts and actions needed by the City. Mayor Fore promised to have something more definitive at next month's meeting. There being no further business or discussion during the regular meeting, an Executive Session was called by Mayor Fore, pursuant to KRS 61.810(1)(f), to discuss city personnel. When complete, the regular meeting will be adjourned.
