The regular meeting of the City Commission was called to order at 7:30 PM on June 13, 2013 at the meeting room of the Hurstbourne Acres City Hall/Police Department, 1916 Hurstbourne Circle, Louisville, Kentucky, with the following persons present;

May 16, 2013 Minutes

After review of the draft copy of the minutes, Commissioner Price made a suggestion to remove the reference to the FBI in the Police Report section. After a discussion, the decision was made to leave the reference unchanged. Mayor Fore then asked the Commission for a motion to approve the minutes as published. The motion passed without opposition.

Police Report

Police Officer, Rusty Bittle, reported on the following;

- Officer Moore completed all necessary training for the year
- Participated in the citywide yard sale, including the placement and removal of the 'No Parking' signs
- Monitored the Blowing Tree Rd. parking situation
- Completed Department of Criminal Justice training
- Home Watches were finished as needed,
- Businesses were checked
- Responded to an 'Officer Needs Assistance' call
- Responded to a dispute about a dog between two parties
- Found water faucet in the Park left on. Commissioner Miles was contacted and the problem resolved
- Police vehicle temporarily out of service due to a charging problem
- J-Town Police Department was contacted and agreed to assist with the problem on Bunsen Way, including the striping of the median, installation of 'No U-Turn' signs, and policing, at their cost. However, any future contacts regarding this situation with J-Town Police must be made by Mayor Fore only.

Attorney's Report

Steve Emery reported that as instructed by the Commission, he has prepared a legal complaint regarding the delinquent property taxes which now needs Treasurer Hollkamp's signature. ABC coordinators from Hurstbourne, St. Matthews, Lyndon, Middletown, Shively, and Douglas Hills have been contacted to learn what they are doing concerning regulatory fees. It was determined that under their ordinances, they are charging a licensing application fee only. Several were unaware that there is a law in Kentucky that allows cities to impose regulatory fees (tax on sales) in addition to the licensing fee. Also, messages were left with the 3 Louisville Metro ABC personnel, but has not yet heard back. It was noted that no city in Jefferson County, including Louisville Metro, is charging regulatory fees. Mayor Fore indicated that more information and discussion is to come at the July meeting. Finally, Attorney Emery is working with Commissioner Renninger regarding new employment contracts with the police personnel.

Treasurer's Report

Sharon Hollkamp read the treasurer's report for May, 2013 and copies were made available for all people in attendance. Commissioner Lynch made a motion to accept as read. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Renninger and passed without opposition.

Warrants

After the City's bond investments were explained and discussed, Sharon Hollkamp read the warrants for May, 2013, and copies were made available for all people in attendance. Commissioner Lynch made a motion to accept as presented. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Renninger which passed unanimously.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Streets

Commissioner Lynch reported on a down stop sign which is being corrected. The location of the potential 'No U-Turn' signs on Bunsen previously discussed will be given to Mayor Fore for communication to J-Town. The question of whether there is truly a parking problem on Blowing Tree, including the need to install 'No Parking' signs, was discussed. This issue will be revisited during the August meeting. Finally, Commissioner Price asked about the cut through in the wall behind Taylorhurst and whether there was any progress in making it handicapped accessible. After a discussion, Attorney Emery was instructed to check with the manager of the property whose contact information was provided by Commissioner Price.

Parks

With Commissioner Miles on vacation, no report was provided.

Sanitation

Commissioner Price advised that the next recycle date is Tuesday June 18, and the next newsletter will include upcoming dates. Bluegrass E-Cycle will be in the City on Saturday July 13 at the corner of Haviland and Addington. A flyer will be delivered to all residents in the city with information as to what electronics can be disposed of. Commissioner Renninger made a suggestion that before any resident recycles their old computers, they make sure that no personal information be left on the hard drive. In response, Commissioner Price was told by Bluegrass E-Cycle that hardware like hard drives are destroyed or made inoperable. Also, information about the disposal of hazardous materials (paint, household chemicals, etc.) will be included in an upcoming newsletter. Finally, the City Bookclub is meeting on Monday June 17 to discuss a novel by Barbara Kingsolver, 'The Bean Trees'.

Police

Commissioner Renninger reported that Chief Redman attended the funeral of the fallen police officer in Bardstown as a routine courtesy and display of respect. Commissioner Renninger attended an 8 hour meeting for Planning and Zoning. Mayor of J-Town attended along with their code enforcement personnel. Based on what was learned in the meeting and her discussions with the McMahan Fire Chief, she discussed the situation with the house on Addington. A resident next door neighbor who is directly impacted by the condition of the house outlined what action her family took to make it safer. During the discussion, Commissioner Price expressed her own frustration in the past to resolve the issues, leaving it to IPL. Mayor Fore explained that the City must follow the law in getting the property maintained, and that the main problem is locating the owner. The Police Department was instructed to contact the mortgagee, Wells Fargo, to see if they will provide an address for the owner, now that a payment has been made.

NEW/OLD BUSINESS

Miscellaneous

Commissioner Lynch expressed his concern about the City's lack of policy in what can and cannot be included as advertising in the Post. After a discussion, including the attorney's comments, it was determined that the advertising by a church does not present or open up any potential law suits to the City. No further action was taken. The City was thanked by a resident about the cleanup of the ditch in front of Nunnlea. Commissioner Price explained that MSD will not return regarding the drainage problem on Blowing Tree until something is done about the gravel drive at the end. Related to that, Commissioner Price also mentioned that the truck traffic on Blowing Tree, including the Eco-Tech trucks, is degrading the asphalt.

There being no further business or discussion during the regular meeting, an Executive Session was called by Mayor Fore, pursuant to KRS 61.810(1)(f), to discuss city personnel. When complete, the regular meeting will be adjourned.

Spotlight on Stanley B Welch Park



In 1998, the Hurstbourne Acres City Park was renamed the Stanley B. Welch City Park in honor of Mr. Stanley B. Welch, who served as Commissioner and Mayor of the City of Hurstbourne Acres for many years.



The park is located on approximately two and one-half acres and provides a nice shaded area for many activities. The brick well house located there is believed to be approximately one hundred years old. Adjacent to the park is a five-acre retention basin and green space with a berm that adds openness and additional space for various activities.



Each year, the City holds its Annual Summer Picnic and an Easter Egg Hunt at the park. The park is also available to residents for personal use and for functions such as family reunions and picnics. A water fountain and plenty of picnic tables are available. The most popular feature of the park is the playground area with new equipment, including swings, sitting on a sandlot.
