Message from Hurstbourne Acres Police Department


Car Break-Ins continue to be on the rise, so please lock your Car and keep your valuables out of sight. Always be aware of what is going on around you. If all of our residents will look out for their neighbors on each side of them and behind them as well as the ones directly across the street from them, then if you See Something, and Say Something. This will enable our Police Officer on duty to have many sets of eyes. So please help us out and See Something, Say Something!

Crime Incident Reporting

Hurstbourne Acres Police Department is now participating in Crime Incident Reporting for citizens. This program is designed so that residents can report online minor crimes and violations. The citizen will log on to kspportal.ky.gov. There will be a menu of what types of crimes the citizen can report. If they meet the criteria, they will simply fill out a do it yourself report. Once completed, they will file it, and KYOPS will forward a copy of it for Hurstbourne Acres Police Department reports. It will be viewed, and determine if any further investigation is needed, if it is one of HAPD officers will investigate

If the resident wants or needs a copy of it for their records they have to go to BuyCrimes to purchase it. I think this will favorably serve our community as well as our department. If we do not have an officer on duty, it will either give them the option of doing it, calling Metro, or waiting for one of our officers to do the report. This process will also satisfy your insurance company.

If anyone has any questions about this program please feel free to ask Officer Bittle or Officer Moore. As always I will gladly answer questions.



Golden Watch: Tips for Seniors to Stay Safe Online

1. Never trust a link sent to you by someone you don't know. By clicking the link you may be taken to a site that may look like your bank or credit card company but isn't. One thing a criminal can't fake is the actual website address of a company or bank. Instead of clicking a link in an email, search for the web address using a search engine to find the real one. Use that to ask the company about the message you received, or call using the number listed on your statements. Mark the real site as a favorite in your browser so that one click brings you there safely every time.

2. Never trust an email that asks for your personal or account information (called a phishing scam). These usually seem convincing (the shabby ones have spelling errors, but the high quality scams look impeccable). No bank or reputable company is going to send you an email asking you to correct your information, validate your identity, re-enter your password, and so on.

3. The smarter scams often contain text warning you against fraud. They do this because many people believe that an email that warns them to be careful must be legitimate. That is not always true. This also extends to sites that claim they have protections in place for your privacy and security. Anybody can make these claims, but only certain sites will protect you.

4. Never respond or even open an email with a deal that is too good to be true unless it is from a company that you know well and expect to get these kinds of offers from them. Scammers want you to react without taking time to think things through, so their emails frequently sound urgent, such as:

a. "If we don't hear by tomorrow, your account will be closed." (and you'll notice that the date of "tomorrow" never is listed).

b. "This offer won't last; order now to ensure."

5. Never believe that someone you don't know is going to give you money.

6. Do not believe a person from another country who just needs you to "help transfer funds" and they need your bank account number to do so. Such scammers promise to give you a huge amount of money for helping them out. The result is an empty bank account. Guard your information well. It is better to be rude than to be ripped off; so demand validation, verification, and authentication before giving your information to anyone. If you still feel uneasy, say no. Or simply call the company, service provider, or bank; and check to make sure they are the ones who have contacted you over the internet. If it seems too good to be true, then it probably is.

November 14, 2013 Minutes

After review of the draft copy of the minutes, they were accepted without opposition.

Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer's report was read by Sharon Holkamp for November 2013 and copies were made available for all people in attendance. A motion was made to accept the Treasurer's Report as written and it was accepted without objection.

Warrants

Warrants were read by Sharon Holkamp. After a discussion of Speed Bump bill, outstanding newsletter warrant and J-Town Transmission bill, a motion to accept the report as presented. It was accepted without objection.

Police Report

Attorney's Report

Steve Emery reported that there is still 1 unpaid property tax bill from fiscal year 2012 to 2013, which is a property in bankruptcy. Letters for collection for the ABC licensing fee were sent out and there was a discussion of local businesses' delinquent taxes (3 years).

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Parks

Commissioner Miles reported that leaf pick-up was rescheduled due to weather. He provided update on brush clean-up on Blowing Tree and Wesley.

Sanitation

Commissioner Price discussed extending Hurstbourne Parkway sidewalk to Hurstbourne Circle or Bunson. Estimates are in progress. Recycle dates for December are 17th and 31st.

Streets

Commissioner Lynch reported that UPS picked up old signs with misspellings. New signs will be put up when weather permits. He discussed snow and ice complaints that the plow make some drive ways inaccessible. Schedule for weed control is in progress. A safety issue of a broken water cap on Hunnington was addressed. The Water Company has been notified. Speed bump payment addressed. Mayor Fore will check on getting 30 day payment instead of payment due upon completion.

Police

Commissioner Renninger reported on the transmission of the Impala. It is fixed and running well. Discussion of ice and snow procedures updated.

NEW/OLD BUSINESS

Wrap and Drop Ordinance

A wrap and drop ordinance states that no commercial business can leave materials and ads at the end of driveways. This was discussed and shelved.

Many residents have received information about: www.nextdoor.com. There was discussion of Hurstbourne Acres joining this, pros and cons listed, issue shelved.

Christmas Lights

Christmas Lights were put up at the City entrances. Four lights were replaced at the entrances.

ABC Ordinance

Mayor Fore met with City Attorney and teleconferenced with League of Cities to address cost and rewards of moist vs dry votes. Mayor proposed retracting the regulatory fee and keeping the licensing fee. City Attorney conducted first reading of amended ABC Regulatory Ordinance.

There being no further business or discussion to be conducted at the open portion of the meeting, Mayor Fore adjourned the meeting.
