There is a one way portion to Hurstbourne Lane and it is from 9100 Hurstbourne Lane to 9118 Hurstbourne Lane. The road goes to S.Hurstbourne Parkway. Tickets for going in the wrong directions on a one way street are costly.

All vehicles should be parked on hard surfaces not in your yard. When parking on the street you need to park in the directions that the traffic is going. When parking on the street do not park across from your neighbors drive way making it difficult for them to exit their drive way. Do not park on street directly across from another car it will not allow for emergency vehicles to get through.

Police

Now that October is here, it means that Halloween is just around the corner. Below are some tips for trick-or-treaters, home owners and motorists from the American Academy of Pediatrics.

COSTUMES: · Plan costumes that are bright and reflective. Make sure that shoes fit well and that costumes are short enough to prevent tripping, entanglement or contact with flame.

- Consider adding reflective tape or striping to costumes and trick-or-treat bags for greater visibility.
- Because masks can limit or block eyesight, consider non-toxic makeup and decorative hats as safer alternatives. Hats should fit properly to prevent them from sliding over eyes.
- When shopping for costumes, wigs and accessories look for and purchase those with a label clearly indicating they are flame resistant.
- If a sword, cane, or stick is a part of your child's costume, make sure it is not sharp or too long. A child may be easily hurt by these accessories if he stumbles or trips.
- Obtain flashlights with fresh batteries for all children and their escorts.
- Do not use decorative contact lenses without an eye examination and a prescription from an eye care professional. While the packaging on decorative lenses will often make claims such as "one size fits all," or "no need to see an eye specialist," obtaining decorative contact lenses without a prescription is both dangerous and illegal. This can cause pain, inflammation, and serious eye disorders and infections, which may lead to permanent vision loss.
- Teach children how to call 9-1-1 (or their local emergency number) if they have an emergency or become lost.
- Exercise extra caution when driving during Trick-or-Treat hours. Foot traffic in residential areas will be increased and small children may become excited and dart into the roadway. Please drive safely.

September 21, 2017 Minutes

Commissioner Nichols made a motion to accept as published. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Renninger and carried without opposition.

Treasurer's Report

Sharon Hollkamp read the report for September, 2017 and copies were made available for all people in attendance. After a discussion, Commissioner Renninger made a motion to accept the report as presented. The motion was seconded by Commissioner McAllister which carried unanimously.

Warrants

Sharon Hollkamp read the warrants for September, 2017 and copies were made available for all people in attendance. A motion to accept the warrants as outlined was made by Commissioner Renninger and seconded by Commissioner Nichols. The motion carried unopposed.

Police Report Police

Chief Griffin reported on the following for September, 2017; -Offense Reports-3, -Accident Reports-1, -Arrests-3, -Traffic Stops-33, - Citations Issued-24, -Warnings Issued-9, - Contact With Other Agencies-5, -House Watches-11, -Courtesy Notices-0, -Directed Patrols-0, -Calls For Service-39, -License Plates Confiscated-2, -Motorist Assists-2, -Funeral Watches-0

September, 2017 Highlights;

-All officers completed monthly KLC recommended training,
-The 3 offense reports were for a recovery of a stolen vehicle at the Meadows Apartment Homes, theft of a vehicle from Enterprise Rental Cars, and a theft from Speedway,
-Officer Phelps completed his mandatory 40 hour annual KLEC in-service training,
-Department supported the city picnic,
-All Golden Watch residents checked on weekly,
-All businesses in shopping centers checked on daily,
-Explorer and Taurus are in good working order.

Attorney's Report

Steve Emery reported that the letter discussed at the last meeting regarding imminent domain was sent to the owners of the Meadows Apartment Homes. The letter required a response by October 1, but the City has not received a reply. Attached to the letter was a 'petition'. Following a discussion, the Commission unanimously voted to serve the petition which is the next step in obtaining the land proposed for the sidewalk on Blowing Tree Road.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Parks

Commissioner Eskridge updated the Commission on the new playground equipment. In addition, he has received a proposal from Bluegrass Playgrounds to replace the balance of the playground equipment along with the bed of the playground. The sand would be removed and replaced with a hard wood mulch. There would be rubber mats in pertinent areas and a new border. The cost has been quoted at \$64,000, and a representative will be at the meeting in December to provide additional information and answer questions. A competing vendor has been asked to provide a quote with comparable equipment, and will be at the meeting next month. Due to the compliments about the Christmas Party last year, Commissioner Eskridge suggested repeating this year, but on a Saturday, 12/16. The party would be an open house at Nunnlea, snacks would be provided, pictures with Santa, and other activities. Preliminary planning is underway with more information to be furnished at next month's meeting. For purposes of setting a budget, Commissioner Eskridge will come up with 3 options for activities and food about which the Commission can vote.

Sanitation

Commissioner McAllister asked about the City's decision to find another auditor. In response, Treasurer Hollkamp said that she has the names of 2 potential replacements. Mayor Fore stated that he wants to stay with the current auditor this year. For early next year, he asked Treasurer Hollkamp to invite auditors she recommends or were recommended to come to a meeting and present their qualifications, pricing and answer questions. Commissioner McAllister updated the Commission on what he found concerning the blocking of the intersection (south end of Hurstbourne Circle). He proposed installing a sign outlining the fines for blocking the intersection to encourage compliance. The Commission approved the purchase of 2 signs. Lastly, Commissioner McAllister noted that the Treasurer's Report has not been added to the website for the past several months. Sharon Hollkamp said that she would get the information to Darrell Waddell right away and make sure it's added.

Streets

As mentioned in last month's meeting, Commissioner Nichols reported that she contacted Spectrum about getting phone service for the City cheaper through them. She was told that the cheaper rate only applies for new customers, and the City of Hurstbourne Acres is already a Spectrum customer through cable and internet service. Nevertheless, Mayor Fore asked Commissioner Nichols and Renninger to coordinate their efforts and contact Spectrum again to see if a city can qualify for the lower rates. Finally, Commissioner Nichols mentioned that Plant Kingdom may begin their landscaping around the city entrance signs on Cardwell Way and Hurstbourne Lane tomorrow. Otherwise, they will start on Monday, 10/16.

Police

Commissioner Renninger said that she contacted Darrell Waddell to update the website. The city picnic notification was removed along with the name of the newsletter editor. Also, the satellite dish application was amended to reflect the correct city meeting time and include the address. Regarding the satellite dish situation at a home on Cardwell Way, Mayor Fore read the letter he wrote to the resident advising her that the location of the dish is still not in compliance with the ordinance. In reply, the resident stated that she has observed several homes in the City, with addresses, with dishes that are also not in compliance with the ordinance. Mayor Fore has asked that our police department visually check and verify the addresses provided. The verification will include the installation dates for those dishes as they may have been there prior to the enacting of the ordinance. Mayor Fore advised that he will personally contact the resident and invite her to the next city meeting. The City can determine the next step once this information has been collected and reviewed. Lastly, all police officers went to the firing range this week and easily passed the requirements.

OLD/NEW BUSINESS

Survey

Commissioner Renninger reviewed the unsolicited survey from Precision Concrete Cutting and noted that the only portion that applies to our City is on Bunsen Parkway. After further discussion, it was decided that the relatively small, potential grant money and liability does not warrant any further action.

2nd Reading of the Nuisance Ordinance

Prior to the second reading, a discussion included a suggestion by Commissioner Nichols to have the ordinance summarized. This would make it easier for publication in the newsletter, and easier for residents to read and understand. No decision to summarize was made at this time. Also, the discussion resulted in changes to the first reading (not material or substantive). Mayor Fore then completed the second reading, with changes, of Ordinance #4, Series 2017, an ordinance replacing Ordinance #1, Series 1993. Commissioner Nichols then made a motion to enact and ordain. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Eskridge and carried unopposed.

Miscellaneous

Resident Marty Dunn reported that there are 2 areas on Blowing Tree Road that need to be patched. Commissioner McAllister offered his services. Resident Doug Rogers mentioned that trees planted along the parking side of Hurstbourne Circle make the curve a blind spot. Mayor Fore said that he would contact Kathleen at Nunnlea. Lastly, it was confirmed that Commissioner Eskridge will continue to do the newsletter until a replacement can be found. In order to get the newsletter out in a more timely fashion, the Commission agreed to provide their articles to Commissioner Eskridge within 10 days of the meeting. There being no further business or discussion the meeting was adjourned.
