Even though the weather is cold and dreary, spring will be here before you know it! As thoughts turn toward outdoor activities, don't forget that residents can reserve the Marty Dunn picnic pavilion **at no charge**. It is a great location for small birthday parties or family gatherings. To reserve the pavilion, contact Troy Eskridge (contact info is on the first page of the Post) with the date and time. We will send you a waiver to sign. It is really that easy!

Below is a list of the rules and requirements.

- No bounce houses or inflatables
- No open fires
- No animal attractions like pony rides or petting zoos
- Pets on leashes are allowed
- All trash needs to be disposed of at the end of the event. A clean-up fee will be issued if reserved area is left dirty.

It also means it is time to check our smoke detectors. If you have an older model that takes a battery, be sure to replace the battery. Test it to make sure it is in proper working order. If not, you will need to replace it. If your detectors have the 10 year lithium battery, then check to see when it was manufactured to make sure it does not need to be replaced. The price to replace a working smoke detector is around \$20. That is a small price to pay for peace of mind. You can purchase a smoke detector at any hardware store, a big box store or even your local grocery store. So, as we all get ready for Spring by checking our smoke detectors, we can also be safe.

January 10, 2019 Minutes

Commissioner Nichols made a motion to accept the minutes as published. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Renninger and carried without opposition.

Treasurer’s Report

Sharon Hollkamp presented the treasurer’s report for January, 2019. Commissioner Eskridge made a motion to approve, and was seconded by Commissioner Renninger. The motion carried unopposed.

Warrants

Sharon Hollkamp read the warrants for January, 2019. Commissioner Nichols made a motion to accept as read. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Bohnenkamp, and passed unanimously.

January Highlights

- All officers completed Kentucky League of Cities recommended monthly training.
- The 2 offense reports were for theft by extortion at the Meadows Apartments and theft from a vehicle at the Meadows Apartments.
- All Golden Watch residents were checked on weekly.
- All businesses in shopping centers were checked on daily.
- Explorer and Taurus are in good working order.

Attorney’s Report

Attorney Howell learned that through the Jefferson County League of Cities & Cable Commission the Kentucky Association of Telecommunications Officers and Advisors are holding an annual meeting/conference in August. The purpose is to discuss a city’s ability to regulate 5G telecommunications (see Hurstbourne Acres’ Ordinance #3, Series 2018) within a city’s limits. There has been a recent ‘preemption’ order regarding a city’s authority. It was recommended that a representative from our City attend the conference. Attorney Howell’s office will provide more information to Mayor McAllister when further details are known.

Attorney Howell prepared and mailed to the legal representatives of the Meadows Apartments an easement and settlement agreement regarding the sidewalk project. Because of issues involving a lack of response, it was recommended that there be further discussion during an executive session to which Mayor McAllister agreed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Parks

Commissioner Eskridge advised that issues regarding the Little Tikes border stakes around the playground have been secured. He himself also did some small tree work around the Park.

In other news, he stated that he received a request from a resident about reserving the park pavilion on 3/17. The signed ‘hold harmless’ agreement should be received from the resident this upcoming week.

Finally, due to the difficulty in getting weather and schedules to cooperate between the tree vendor and Commissioner Eskridge, the previously mentioned tree work is being placed on hold.

Sanitation

Commissioner Bohnenkamp received 2 complaints; missed yard waste pickup and a delay in regular garbage pickup about which no one was made

aware. She contacted EcoTech and resolved the problem.

Also, it was determined that there were fewer problems with contamination of recycle with regular garbage under the old schedule. Therefore, effective the week of 3/4, both recycle and garbage will again be picked up on Tuesday with pickup of yard waste remaining on Monday

Streets and Lighting

When contacted, MSD advised Commissioner Nichols that the drainage problem around the median at Taylorsville Road and Hurstbourne Lane is the responsibility of the State Highway Department. She was advised that the person to contact will be back in the office on Monday at which time she will call.

In her efforts to get updated information on the installation of the flashing yellow left turn light at Taylorsville Road and Blowing Tree Road, Commissioner Nichols was directed to contact Chris at the office of Louisville Metro Representative Marilyn Parker. He was contacted once, but will be contacted again to clarify the situation. Attorney Howell, who has other business with Marilyn Parker's office, will also ask about this.

Lastly, the Hurstbourne Circle street entrance light near the bus stop is still not working consistently. Commissioner Nichols said that she would contact the person with LG&E who handles the street lights for our City.

Police

Commissioner Renninger was advised by Mayor McAllister that as soon as the new printer can be secured, it will be installed. The principal use will be for printing of the city newsletter.

Old/New Business

Edward Jones Representative

Matt Anderson with Edward Jones Investments came to answer any questions that the Commission

or residents may have regarding our City's investments.

Communications Service Franchise Bids

It was incorrectly stated at last month's meeting that our City received bids for communications services. Therefore, we are still operating under the same contract existing before the request for bids was published.

Sidewalk Bid

Mayor McAllister received a bid of \$17,800 for the construction of the sidewalk on Blowing Tree Road. However, he plans on securing at least one more bid before presenting to Marilyn Parker's office.

Children at Play Sign

Commissioner Nichols confirmed that the 'children at play' sign on Woodfield Road has been moved from the street sign to its own pole. It was agreed that the commissioners will have a chance to look at the sign and report at next month's meeting.

PNC Account

Following a request by Mayor McAllister, Commissioner Renninger made a motion to have current Mayor, Terry McAllister, added to the City's PNC account with all of its rights and privileges and former Mayor Sean Fore removed from the account. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Eskridge. The motion carried unanimously.

Indoor Fun Park at Old Walmart

A new indoor fun park is being proposed for the old Walmart location on the other side of Hurstbourne Parkway. Our City has been asked for our input at a meeting that is being held on 2/28. Mayor McAllister will be attending and report back at next month's meeting.

Increase in Insurance Premium Tax

Mayor Greg Fischer wants to triple Louisville's insurance premium tax over the next four years to fund the city's rising pension obligations and avoid major cuts to the budget. Attorney Howell was asked about the details. He advised that as soon as

his office has more information, they will contact our commission with their input.

Nomination for Mayor Pro Tempore

Commissioner Nichols nominated Commissioner Eskridge for the position of Mayor Pro Tempore. The position is currently held by Commissioner Renninger. After a brief discussion, the Commission voted unanimously in favor of the nomination.

There being no further business or discussion, Commissioner Nichols made a motion to recess the meeting to allow for an executive session. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Eskridge and carried without opposition. Once the executive session is complete, the regular meeting will be rejoined and then adjourned.
